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The author graduates from Princeton and takes a job with the Laos Tourism Bureau in Vientiane in 1998. The book recounts his work experiences and interactions with co-workers and personal experiences with other Laos citizens.

LAOS BACKGROUND; AUTHOR'S WORK EXPERIENCE

- → Laos Median Age: 19.3, youngest in Asia
- → Attention and infrastructure on capital city with little attention to rural areas
- → 19th Century France incorporates Laos into Indochina with Vietnam and Cambodia
- → Laos same size as Great Britian
- Three main ethnic categories based upon the elevation at which they live: Lao Soung (10-20%, high mountain), Lao Theung (20-30%, low mountain), and Lao Loum (50%, lowland, traditional rulers) somewhat arbitrary as at least 68 different ethnic groups (own language, culture, etc.)
- → Economy heavily reliant on exports to Thailand baht slides, Laos kip depreciates as well low foreign reserves to withstand
- → Single most heavily bombed country in the history of warfare secret war in Laos, US drops more bombs on Laos than in all of WWII; \$2 million per day, every day from 1964 through 1973
